We are not asking for money, we are asking your support. Specifically, that:

- **1.** Hornsby Shire Council lobby for:
 - An extension to the public 591 bus route (Hornsby to St Ives Shops via Waitara) currently terminating at St Ives Village, to include a St Ives High Yarrabung Road loop, and
 - More frequent public 582 bus services between Yarrabung Road and Gordon Station.

2. The General Manager write to each of the local State and Federal Members of Parliament; the Minister for Transport; and the Secretary of Transport seeking support for, and commitment to, these changes to the 591 bus route and additional 582 services being provided.

3. Council also lobby State Rail and Members of Parliament for more frequent train services between Hornsby and Berowra, and that these additional services integrate with connecting bus services.

Why are we asking for Council's support?


The 14 July motion that HSC lobby NSW State Government for better services between Berowra and Hawkesbury River Stations benefits visitors, Brooklyn residents and potential residents from any Peat's Island development.

We want Council to show their support for all public co-ed high school students and their families living in the Hornsby LGA by lobbying the NSW State Government for better transport services. Transport provision has not kept pace with local population increases as can be seen the table below.

Barrier counts = a rounded average of a three day sample, usually taken on Tues, Wed and Thurs. Represent a 'typical day'.



The St Ives High School Catchment Area is **unique** in that it includes the local St Ives Area plus the Northern Draw, comprising Waitara/ Hornsby and suburbs north of Hornsby as far as Mount Ku-Ring-Gai.

Nearly 50% of the total student population currently resides outside the St Ives Catchment, meaning they rely on public transport to get to and from school.

Fast Facts About Bus Services for Northern Draw St Ives High Students:

- There are no direct transport options between the North Draw Catchment (from Waitara to Mt Kuring-Gai) and St Ives High School
- There is currently no direct bus service from the major transport hub of Hornsby to St Ives High School. The H594 Hornsby to the City commuter service was cancelled in 2018.
- Even at full capacity (63 people per bus) St Ives High Northern Draw students alone would fill 9 buses to Gordon Station. Transdev currently only provides 5 school buses.

Why has the provision of transport not kept pace with student numbers?

Fast Facts about the St Ives High Student Body:

- More than 550 students from the Hornsby Electorate Wards A and B attend St Ives High School. This is their co-ed public catchment high school.
- Extracurricular activities are an essential part of the St Ives High Student Wellbeing Programme. Bus Services outside regular bell times are inadequate and unreliable.
 Northern Draw students who want to participate in the many extracurricular activities on offer must be driven to school or they miss out.
- Every week over 400 St Ives High senior students attend **mandatory Period Zero and Period Six classes.** Period Zero starts at 7.47 AM and Period Six finishes at 4.15 PM. There are **no scheduled bus services to cater for these students**.

We need solutions. Student Enrolments at St Ives High are Steadily Increasing and so are the transport problems....

There has been a steady increase in student numbers from both catchments but no corresponding increase in transport services to meet increased demand.

In 2022 there will be over 500 students from the Northern Draw....

These suburbs are targeted in the Hornsby Shire Housing Strategy for more dwellings. The resulting population increase is feeding through into school enrolments and increased patronage at the local train stations. Local residents would also benefit from more train services between Hornsby & Berowra.

Students living beyond Hornsby Asquith – Berowra

These students can often spend up to three hours a day commuting to and from their catchment public, co-ed high school because of inadequate bus services and the low frequency of train services stopping beyond Hornsby. There are not enough bus services for students and the train and bus schedules are not aligned.

4 buses at maximum capacity are required for students living beyond Hornsby to get to Gordon Station in time for the 3.45 PM train

or face a <u>30 minute wait</u> for the next train that stops at Asquith, Mt Colah, Mt Ku-ring-gai and Berowra.

Students living in Hornsby or Waitara

These students can spend up to two hours a day commuting to school. They are most likely to live at a distance from a train station, so the train/bus combination is very inefficient. These students catch two buses and a train, or sometimes three buses, for a journey that would take less than 20 minutes by car. They do not qualify for a Push Pass, so must wait until students living beyond Hornsby have boarded the bus. They can wait a long time to get on the first bus!

A 591 service extended to St Ives High School would give these students a quicker and direct means of travel home.

5 buses are required to get students living in Hornsby or Waitara to Gordon Station [310/63 **Transdev stated Max Bus Capacity**]

[254 students/63 Transdev Max Bus Capacity] • In 2022 there will be enough Northern Draw Students fill 9 buses and yet there are currently only 5 school buses from St Ives High direct to Gordon Station at the afternoon bell. A shortfall of 4 buses



We have done the groundwork and gathered data and feedback about transport issues to supports our case.

Our 2020 and 2021 campaign survey feedback demonstrates that the lack of integrated train and bus services, poor scheduling, and insufficient capacity for the growing number of students who need to use them:

- has a negative impact on the wellbeing of students, who face unpredictable and unacceptably long journey times to and from school
- has a negative impact on the environment, as parents opt to drive their children due to the lack of viable transport options
- creates inequality for many students who wish to take part in extra-curricular activities that are part of school life but have no access to a viable transport service and do not have anyone to drive them to and from St lves High. It also creates challenges for senior students attending Period 0 and Period 6 outside of regular bell times.



St Ives High School P&C Association 2020 Student Transport & Traffic Survey. Open 26th August to 5th September 2020.

This survey had a 46% response rate. 400 families completed the survey, representing 517 students



Local St Ives Community Outreach. Open 3rd to 18th October 2020.

St Ives High School P&C Association wants St Ives High to be a good neighbour. Our transport issues go hand-inhand with local traffic issues around St Ives High. We used an online form to collect feedback from local residents regarding traffic (volumes/flow/management), pedestrian safety and experience, and public transport services to the area.

We received 135 responses from concerned local residents

The St Ives High Transport and Traffic Campaign

is a uniting force across schools and communities. We have built a campaign network from stretching from Mt Ku-ring-gai to St Ives and beyond. This campaign has demonstrated an unprecedented level of cooperation between P&C Associations.

St Ives Primary P&C Association Traffic & Pedestrian Survey Open 13-24th October


The purpose of this survey is to gather data from the St lves Public School (SIPS) community about how our children are travelling TO and FROM school and what the St lves Primary community concerns are regarding the pedestrian experience and traffic in the local area.

227 families have responded to this survey, representing approximately 58% of families at the school.

2020 St Ives High Student Transport & Traffic Survey One survey per St Ives High family. 400 responses, 46% response rate




Responses by State Electorate [n=400]




2020 Northern Draw Petition for Better Transport to St Ives High Breakdown of Responses by Ward of Residence [n=496]

On average it currently takes me over an hour to get home from school when it would be less than 10 minutes to drive. I live really close....At the moment, the majority of my time between the bell and arriving at home is spent waiting to be allowed into the bus line because so many people have push passes* because they all live in the Hornsby area. SIHS Student My daughter left school at 3.15pm on Thursday afternoon and only managed to be at 4.40pm at home. We live in Hornsby. This includes 2 bus rides and a train. For a 25 minute car drive, where is the incentive to use public transport and reduce traffic congestion? -SIHS Parent

The bus from Gordon station to St Ives high school is regularly late or does not turn up. The amount of buses in the afternoon is inadequate and my child is left standing, sometimes for an hr before being able to board a bus to Gordon station. The limited times this bus runs also impacts my child's options for participating in extracurricular activities. This is a weekly issue and my child is late to school at least two times per week, despite leaving home the same time every morning. Waiting for a bus 40 mins over the scheduled bus time table, is unacceptable! This service is currently completely inadequate for the demand, to and from Gordon station to St Ives High.—SIHS Parent We definitely need St Ives High School bus loop! There are lots of students that go to SIHS from Hornsby & beyond which requires extended travel time as there is no direct bus service to the school! There is huge traffic congestion in the morning & afternoon peak hours.

My children have not been able to participate in some extra curricular activities i.e .band, due to the lack of public transport options. I have had to take time off work to drive my child to/from school activities due to a lack of transport options. SIHS Parent

> We are Masada parents and spend a truck load of time driving our kids around and having to pay for a private bus to school because the public bus system is so infrequent. We are strong supporters of your campaign The increase in the regularity of the 194 and 195 has been welcome but it is still skewed towards city commuters rather than school kids heading the other way. I also suspect that with more people working from home you may get support from this group too Thank you for your efforts - Masada **College Carer**

Survey Feedback - Overcrowded Services (& COVID Concerns)

I have driven my son to and from school every day since Covid, as I don't find the risk of being on public transport - particularly squashed on buses acceptable. 2020 SIHS Survey, Hornsby Too many transfers, long journey, over crowded train station and bus station, and over crowded train car and bus will take big chances for COVID 19 virus spread. 2020 SIHS Survey, Hornsby Because of COVID and the over crowded buses and trains in peak times, I have to drive my students to and from school. this means that I have to take time off to travel to school and then travel back in the ever-growing traffic in the morning/afternoon.

Overcrowding & COVID Concerns


Busses are PACKED 'body-to-body' with children from all year groups together, therefore completely COVID-unsafe. However, as long as there are only a few busses, there is no alternative for kids to arrive home within an acceptable time frame. Government rules regarding separation of students in year groups at schools is a worthless exercise as long as this continues to be accepted. 2020 SIHS Survey, Mt Ku-ring-gai It's impossible for children to follow social distancing rules in over crowded buses 2020 SIHS Survey, Waitara

Students cannot social distance on the buses between school and Gordon station as they have to pack on to the buses. 2020 SIHS Survey Mt Colah

I have 1 child at St Ives High currently and 3 more to follow in future years. My child in Year 7 says current **buses to and from Gordon station are very crowded.** His ability to participate in run club and boot camp is impacted by the limited transport options early in the morning and the inability for parents to always drive him to school early.


2021, 591_582 Bus Campaign Petition Responses Breakdown by Suburb of Residence [702 responses]

- **3.** 5% [8] drop/collect student for Senior Period Zero/Six

Ward B Hornsby, Normanhurst, Waitara 230 Responses, 33% of total of 702

Top 3 Ward B reasons for driving to St Ives High:

- 1. 53% [89] drop/collect student at bell time
- 2. 33% [55] drop/collect student for extracurriculars
- **3.** 8% [14] drop/collect student for Senior Period Zero/Six

Ward A

42 participants also left feedback on transport issues for their MP/Cllr as well as signing the petition

Ward B

70 participants also left feedback on transport issues for their MP/Cllr as well as signing the petition Our requested changes to the 591 service would benefit up to 7 schools located along a route that includes a St Ives High loop:

The following schools are located on an extended 591 bus route:

- Waitara Public School
- Hornsby Girls High
- Corpus Christi (St Ives)
- Masada College (St Ives)
- St Ives Public School
- St Ives High School
- Intensive English Centre (St Ives HS)

Our requested changes to the 591 and 582 services would benefit the wider community too:

- Parents who would not have to drive their children in peak hour traffic to get to/from school, especially for before school activities
- The Environment! A significant reduction in the number of private vehicles being used to drive students to and from their high school.
- The 2,000 plus patrons who attend activities on the St Ives High and St Ives Public School campuses outside of regular bell times each week, including North Shore Basketball and Australian Girls' Choir.
- Patrons of the planned St Ives High Indoor Community Sports Centre (under assessment), hours 4-11 pm school days, 7 am – 11 pm weekends & school holidays.

More train services between Hornsby and Asquith would benefit the communities who live in suburbs where the local population is steadily increasing, like Asquith, Mount Colah and Mount Ku-ring-gai.
